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Honestly to me presented to a classroom audience is a little more settling for me, as nerve reckoning as it is, I don't seem to tense up. With me I just take some breathe, adjust the crowd and speak about whatever the nature of my subject is on. I would say I'm well crowd orientated, I like to ask questions and bring up similar scenarios to the audience but being alone and not actually looking back at someone is kind of creepy for me, at the same time it's nothing wrong with looking at a computer and not having the sense of panic that you usually get in a class or auditorium setting. Just for me I know majority of the time I would have a better feel knowing and seeing the reactions I get from the people instead of recording myself.

The only trouble I had with uploading the video was finding where the link should go and how I could transfer the video for the teacher (Ms. Gessler) to just click on it and allows her access right to the video. My struggle always comes to that when I try to copy a link or place specially at the right spot. That was my biggest problem other than that I had no other real issues.

Posting the video and recording myself would probably be what I'd choose as the easiest part for me, also YouTube isn't that hard to break down and find where and how to post your video. Making it public was the least of my worries and everything after that came easy to me, I'm always on YouTube so I know how to upload or post because I would actually like to start my own channel or a group channel with some of my friends back home.

If I can be unbiased about this one, I'd say it's all about the delivery, if your energy matches the project then I don't think it matters how or where you present. If you can get people fired up or impressed with what you talked about through a online speech then more power to you but seeing as it's our own opinion I think being in front of people and having an audience to go off of and read body language would be the choice I pick if I was bringing forth a project or topic I had to explain or talk about.

I understood what to talk about and described my key components, made sure the audience know when I jump to each slide and discuss what's being presented. I had good posture through the speech I mentioned how it effects all athletes from a young age, damages on the inside from years of improper tackling. I ran by the symptoms and what it does to the brain. Then, I talked about the issues that come with playing this dangerous game.

Noise can always play a role when your presenting an online project because with me personally, I live off campus, so I don't know if my roommate would come in and break the silence by bringing someone in or allowing the outside to render my presentation. If the window happened to be open a car or busses could be going by causing noises that can interrupt your focus and concentration that you had while explaining your project.

I would say it's important because you never know when your job needs you to have conferences through webcam or need a presentation sent out to the HR and higher people within the job. It just goes to show that your tech savvy and can perform under the new era rules by recording yourself and have the knowledge to present it without any problems. Most people are conformable with being inside of their home or own space because some freeze up in person and palms could sweat, or nerves might be the issue but being alone might ease their mind.

To me I'd rather be in class interacting with the crowd and seeing reactions on what I decided to bring forth to the class. I won't have a problem with online presenting but with all the work and

effort I would put in or all the time I lost by doing this project, I'd want people to view my work and understand that I put time into it.
